

Our yearly symposium is a free event offered to both members and non-members. Whether you are a new or established homeowner, we promise you that you will not go home empty handed. Come learn about the best soils, mulches, antique roses, food plant varieties, etc. for the Houston area and go home with free plants!

10:15am Choice of tours:

- 1. Tour of the compost/ mulch operation by John Ferguson, owner of Nature's Way Resources
 John's knowledge of our Texas soil is incredible as is the facility he has built. There is always much to
 learn from him. If you are new to the area or if you are trying to rehabilitate a yard that just can't seem
 to thrive, this is where you need to be, though all gardeners should take this tour at least once. Bring your
 camera to get a shot of the enormous smoking hills of compost. With Q&A, the 1/2-mile walking tour takes
 about an hour. NB: the ground can be a bit uneven and if it has rained, bring your galoshes.
- 2. Tour of the nursery garden center by Mark Bowen, general manager of Nature's Way Resources If you have already toured the compost/mulch facility, or are not able to take such a robust walking tour, Mark will take a group through the nursery garden center explaining what they offer and answering questions about the best plants to use in the garden. He will explain the plans for developing the 10 acres set aside for the expanded nursery grounds that will make it unique among Texas horticultural retailers.

11:30am "Building Healthy Soils - To improve your garden AND protect your family"

Noon 2nd lotto drawing for all, plus a special drawing for new homeowners.


12:20pm Lunch – hamburgers and drinks provided by the Texas Rose Rustlers. Potluck sides and desserts appreciated.
